Later in the story, Charlie Brown has chosen the worse tree imaginable, it is sparse and plain. But then Linus takes his blanket, his beloved blanket, and wraps it around the tree. The tree is transformed into a beautiful tree standing tall and full. The love and comfort Linus has given and received from the blanket has changed the tree just as God's love can transform us and we can use that love to comfort and be an example to others.
