### **Mini Pantry Update**

As our Mini Pantry enters a new year we have learned much in a very short period of time. We believe the folks frequenting the pantry are not necessarily homeless but those suffering from "food insecurities" for various reasons. We have determined that the microwaveable food items, convenient food items and snack items are going rather quickly, while the foods that provide a meal and/or side dish for a family meal are all to often left behind.

So...where do we go from here?

January, February, March and early April will continue to provide challenges due to the potential severe weather which limits the food that we can use to stock the pantry. We cannot place items that will freeze and potentially explode. Signage has been placed inside the Mini Pantry to inform our donors of the concerns going into the long winter months. There is still much we can do, we just need to 'think outside the box". We are asking for donations of food staples that will not be compromised in severe temperatures.

A "communications board" will be placed next to the **Wagon of Hope** with updated needs for the Mini Pantry. We are moving towards a system that will allow us better and more accurate monitoring of the food items donated and utilized by those seeking our help. We believe this has been a wonderful outreach ministry for UUMC. The congregation has richly blessed the success of this outreach and for that we are truly grateful. Our community has provided both financial and food assistance as so many have learned of this incredible outreach.

### **End of Year Giving Statements/Stewardship Commitment Letter**

The end of year giving statements are ready to be picked up. During the 3rd quarter I ran into trouble with trying to e-mail statements. It was decided that I would just print all statements and you could pick up at your convenience. I was also able to complete the commitment letters. If you turned in a stewardship pledge card, you will receive a letter along with your statement confirming your pledge for the year. If you had marked giving weekly, your weekly pledge was multiplied by number of weeks in the year to get an annual giving total amount. If you marked monthly, then that amount was multiplied by 12 months to get an annual total. We hope that this letter finds you and your family in good health and ready for the challenges and joys of the New Year. What a wonderful year it was, celebrating 200 years of church life in the community. Just think of how many hearts were touched by the love of Jesus Christ over all those years.

Al Manning: for the past 16 years I have been the Chairman of the Endowment Committee, and during that time the Fund has shown continuous growth and has been able to provide additional support to many ministries. We have certainly been blessed, and I want to thank all of you that have made this happen, with both your support and donations over the years. This year will be my last year as Chair of the Endowment Committee. I feel it is time for new leadership, with some fresh ideas.

2023 was a good year. Compared to 2022, the Fund account grew by about 13%. We ended 2022 with a balance of \$230,711. The balance for 2023 was \$261,367. Just as a reminder, the Endowment Fund is managed by the United Methodist Foundation of Michigan; they have done a wonderful job with our investments over the years. Last year, 2023, we disbursed \$7,240, listed below is where the money was used:

\$4,500 - church 200 year anniversary celebrations \$1,000 - STARS/EXCEL Programs \$240 - Stephen Ministry Conference \$1,000 - MCREST \$500 - Methodist Children's Home

Please consider the Endowment Fund in your estate planning or weekly giving (beyond your regular pledge). The purpose of an Endowment Fund is to provide income on a long-term basis to the many ministries that make our church a vibrant church, a church in which people will find the love and fellowship that only God can provide. #### A Lesson Learned

Several years ago, I had a tire that lost air every day. I was stopping at least once a day to put air in this tire. I mentioned it to my husband that I needed new tires. He agreed and said he would go with me to buy new tires. However, the time was never right for over a month, and I continued to stop and put air in my tires daily. I began to get a little aggravated and so decided to take care of it on my own. I went to a local tire store and asked for their best tires. They said, "Michelin." I said, "I'll take 4 of them." When I arrived home, I told husband that I had taken care of the tires. He asked what kind I had purchased, and I told him. He became a little irate and said that those were the most expensive tires, and I could have gotten something cheaper. I just said, "I had to do it myself and this is what I chose." Then Christmas was coming, and we needed to get a tree. Once again, I was unable to get his help. So, I stopped at a tree lot and saw this most gorgeous tree. It was tall, full, and perfect. The man at the lot said, "That tree is expensive." I said, "Good." And I bought the tree. I arrived home with the tree, and we took it in the house. My husband raved about what an excellent job I had done to find such a beautiful tree. Then he asked the final question, "How much did it cost?" I said, "A lot, it's a Michelin." The next year we bought our last "real" tree and the next time I needed new tires he was not able to help me and I bought them on my own and they were not Michelin's. Perhaps I was being prepared for that day when I would have to do it on my own.

Jesus needed Saul and he changed him.

Saul was on the road to Damascus. Acts 9:3-9 As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. Be with our church, help us to take in the stranger, to comfort and support those around us and to live lives worthy of followers of those who went before us.
