In a pinch. I saved sharing the recipe for the Mushroom Soup I brought to the Cook-off for a week when my time was crunched. This week has been a cruncher. FYI, I used Portobello mushrooms since Cremini were not available on the day I shopped. Enjoy!

Hungarian Mushroom Soup

Ingredients

- 4 tablespoons salted butter
- 1 large yellow onion, chopped
- 1 pound cremini mushrooms, sliced
- 2 cups chicken or vegetable stock
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 2 teaspoons dried dill
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh thyme leaves
- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 cup whole milk
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice, from 1 lemon (optional)
- 2 tablespoons fresh Italian parsley (optional)

Directions

1. Melt butter in a large pot over medium heat. When the butter is melted, add onions and mushrooms and cook, stirring occasionally, until onions are soft and translucent, about 8 minutes. Add the stock, white wine, dill, thyme, paprika, worcestershire and salt. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce to a simmer over low heat and cook, stirring occasionally, until the liquid reduces by $\frac{1}{3}$, about 10 minutes.

2. In a small bowl, whisk flour into the milk until smooth. Add the milk mixture to the soup and cook, stirring occasionally, until the soup begins to thicken, about 10 more minutes.

3. Over low heat, slowly stir in the sour cream, and lemon juice until fully incorporated.

4. Divide the soup into four bowls and top with fresh parsley to serve.

The baskets were donated by Utica UMC and were tailored to the wants and needs of 5 teenage girls and 5 teenage boys. Several churches have teamed up to assist MCHS with providing Easter Baskets to the residents and clients who participate in the children's programs.

The day of the delivery, I met with Eriann Scharer at the facility. She arranged the needs lists and contacted Methodist churches to solicit donations for the Easter Baskets. She expressed her gratitude for the response from Utica UMC and is preparing to present these gifts to the children on Easter Sunday. On behalf of the MCHS, she extended a word of thanks and extended an invitation for members of our congregation to come for a tour of the site this Spring. TIM is planning to arrange the tour during the month of May, so please plan to participate and see what a wonderful setting that the Children's Home is located on.

For those who are not familiar with the MCHS story, this site was the result of caring Christian women including Anna Kresge (wife of S.S. Kresge) in response to the Spanish Flu pandemic in the early 20th century. For over 100 years, children in need of support have been cared for at this facility. Utica UMC has been a supporter of the Children's Home for many years and have shared Jesus' love with our financial support and special needs collections of sporting goods, personal hygiene supplies, and more, over the years. Thank you for your contributions and please offer your prayers for these children. One final request is for you to join us when we tour the site during the month of May, 2024. THE WEEKLY MESSENGER Matthew. One of the Thirteen

Matthew the Apostle was a successful man. He was a Tax Collector, good at his career, a success, well off, but tax collectors were not well thought of in the community, they seemed to be cheaters, often friendless, with no mercy, associated with the authorities, and money grabbers. They were, however, as I said, well off and therefore a success to many. Jesus saw Matthew at his table collecting taxes and said to him, "Follow me." Matthew rose up and followed Jesus just as the others had done. I thought that Matthew would have been the holder of the purse strings, but that was Judas. Perhaps Matthew had had enough of money and the problems it brought into his life. Matthew had probably learned that money won't buy you a lot of things, like happiness, peace of mind, salvation, or success in relationships. Poverty doesn't buy you these things either. A life of service for others, belief and faith in God and salvation comes much closer. He changed his life. He gave up his success. Died a Martyr's death, but died with his faith, love of others, belief in something bigger and better than himself, and love of Christ intact. He changed his life for a life of giving to others rather than himself, a life of bringing others to Christ, J. Ellsworth Kalas writes that Matthew was to many the picture of success, well off with the ability to become even richer and was in a profession unlikely to suffer from inflation or depression. But Jesus looked at this tax collector and said his words, "Follow me" and like the others Matthew heard those words and left his wealth and career behind and followed Jesus.

Matthew 9:9-13 As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the Tax Collectors booth. "Follow me" he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him. While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with him and his disciples. When the Phrases saw this, they asked the disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners? On hearing this Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But go and learn what this means: I desire mercy, not sacrifice. For I have come not to call the righteous but sinners."

Lord, we thank you for each day given to us with another chance to do your will and another chance at forgiveness when we fail. Be with our church, be with those who are ill and those who grieve. Be with us as we seek your will in our lives, help us as we seek to help those who hunger, those who need you in their lives, those who thirst for your word. Be with Pastor Don and Laura and their family, guide and protect them. Be with our staff and leaders as they seek to serve the church. May we always feel your love and mercy surround us. May we in this time, in this place, be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ for it is in his name we pray and have our trust. Amen
