THE WEEKLY MESSENGER 2024 YEAR END FINANCIAL SUMMARY FOR GOD'S GLORY!

2024 is "in the books". And, the Operating Fund income of \$392,207 was sufficient to fulfill our Operating Fund expenses of \$391,334 (net \$873). This allowed us to maintain our year-to-year carry-forward reserve of \$25,000. Thank you for your generous and faithful giving. Truly, your gifts were for God's glory!

The Operating Fund provides the foundation of our ministries. It includes staff compensation, conference pensions and ministry shares, office technology and supplies, communications, administration, property upkeep, utilities, insurance, music, and Christian education resources.

Additionally in 2024, \$53,370 was given for specific purposes/ministries. These gifts are the primary source of funding for these things. Funds received are designated for the individual ministries and they are only used for these specific things. The gifts included:

- \$3,621 for Special Offerings (World Communion, Student Day, UMCOR, Human Relations Day, Native American Awareness, and Peace with Justice)
- \$4,440 for Winter Shelter, MCREST, Oil Change Ministry, Mini Pantry, and Friend in Need
- \$4,952 for STARS, XCEL, and Youth programs
- \$10,736 for the Pipe Organ Fund
- \$13,055 for Build Beyond the Building projects
- \$16,566 for Together In Mission projects

Similar to the parable of the bags of gold, hear your master saying, "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!" (Matthew 25:21 NIV)

So, let us share in our master's happiness today. And, let us look forward to what we will be called to do for God's glory in the year ahead. As good stewards of our resources, the Operating Fund budget approved for 2025 is comparable to 2024. We also anticipate our ministries will require comparable financial and other resources in 2025 to what were needed in 2024. I can't wait to see all the places God will lead us and how God will use us in 2025!

A few giving notes:

If you are bringing your offering envelope to church, please do not seal it and don't tape it shut. It is also appreciated if you put your name on your offering envelope.

We are able to receive contributions in the form of cash, checks, stocks/bonds/mutual funds, etc. We also have e-Giving available for your convenience. If you would like to make a gift of stocks/bonds/ mutual funds or a qualified charitable distribution from your IRA please let the office know so we are aware to watch for this.

To our brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ, welcome to 2025 and Happy New Year!

As we look forward to a year full of God's blessings, we look back to thank God for His guidance and blessings in 2024. God is GOOD! With the leadership of our Together in Mission team, the Utica United Methodist Church family brought glory to God through the many ministries supported by all of us. May God continue to bless this church family at UUMC as we reach out to our community with His love to care for the needy and to bring hope to the lost. Through our many initiatives in 2024, we were able to bring spiritual growth to many through our services and generosity to the ministries we support. Here is a summary of the ministry events for 2024:

January - While Pastor Don was absent on an African Mission Trip, we had our missionary from God's Country Community Ministries, Randy Hildebrandt serve as our spiritual leader. Shortly after this Sunday worship, Utica UMC enrolled a team of volunteers to serve GCCM on a mission trip in June.

February – UMCOR administrative and Natural Disaster Relief contributions were heavily supported by Utica UMC raising in excess of \$2000. With the many natural disasters in Florida, the east coast and the west coast, our donations have been put to good use in restoring the healing and bringing a sense of peace to the victims.

Through our Easter Offering, we enabled financial support for our Missionaries - Randy Hildebrandt of God's Country Community Ministries and Temba Nkomozepi of Mujila Falls Agricultural Center in Zambia, Africa.

April – In addition to our meal support for up to 90 people of the MCREST community, which is now located in Mt. Clemens, a small group of workers spent a Saturday afternoon helping with the Hands with Detroit work day at Cass Community Services.

May - About a dozen members of Utica UMC attended a walking tour of the Methodist Children's Home Society grounds located in Redford. We learned of the many child and youth programs offered at the site and of the many services staff provides for the fostering community to place children in the care of a loving home.

June – The Utica UMC Mission Team hosted several fundraising activities and a collection of household goods to support the Church Mouse program leading to our trip to God's Country Community Ministries in the Michigan Upper Peninsula. In addition to completing several construction and renovation projects, the largest ever attended Church Mouse shopping event occurred during our time in Newberry, MI. The UUMC Mission Team was blessed with a very rewarding experience in God's Country sharing the love of our church family with the members of the community.

August – During a Mission Moment at the beginning of services, Kathy Weaver provided an update on the progress achieved at the Mujila Falls Agricultural Center. Through the ministry led by missionary, Temba Nkomozepi, we have been able to follow the improvements being introduced to the Lundy tribe to bring more productive harvests and new forms of income to this needy area of northwestern Zambia.

September – Once again with our Christian partners at Trinity Lutheran and King of Kings Lutheran churches, Utica UMC hosted a free oil change event led by Ron Borgacz and members of our church family. Over 55 low income guests were able to receive an oil change, served a meal and have a brief conversation with our servant volunteers. The recipients of these services are truly grateful for the warm love received during their visit to our church.

October – As we prepared for the time of harvest and thanksgiving, a Love Loaf Collection began that ultimately netted offerings to be used to support the many ministry pledges of our church. The collection totaled over \$1600 toward the pledges. Praise God!

November - In addition to the Love Loaf Collection that was completed prior to our Thanksgiving Day celebration, Utica UMC collected 78 pies for the Baldwin Center. The pies were served to the guests of the center as a part of their Thanksgiving Meal. Thank you for your generosity.

December – Thank you so much for your Christmas Offering. The collection provided funding to fulfill pledges to the Methodist Children's Home Society, Cass Community Services and the Baldwin Center. In addition, support was provided for the Haiti Children Project and our local Good Shepherd Coalition. May we all be thankful for the opportunity to serve God through our Utica UMC church family.

As we reflect back on the many examples of being Together In Mission, we are grateful to lead our brothers and sisters at Utica UMC in bringing glory to God through our heartfelt support of multiple ministries serving a wide variety of God's children in need. As we begin 2025, ask yourself if you feel drawn to take a more active role in your service to God? If you hear a calling to answer, watch for the many opportunities to offer your services in support of local ministries or by joining our Mission Team for a week-long trip to God's Country.
